M5: Integration

(a) Compute $\int x^3 \sqrt{x^2 + 1} dx$

Solution:

Take $u = x^2 + 1$ so $du = 2x dx$, then $dx = \frac{du}{2x}$ and $x^2 = u - 1$. We have

$$\begin{aligned} \int x^3 \sqrt{x^2 + 1} dx &= \int x^3 \sqrt{u} \frac{du}{2x} = \int \frac{x^2}{2} \sqrt{u} du \\ &= \frac{1}{2} \int (u - 1) \sqrt{u} du = \frac{1}{2} \int u^{3/2} - u^{1/2} du \\ &= \frac{1}{2} \left(\frac{u^{5/2}}{5/2} - \frac{u^{3/2}}{3/2} \right) + C \\ &= \left(\frac{u^{5/2}}{5} - \frac{u^{3/2}}{3} \right) \end{aligned}$$

(b) **By changing the bounds of the integral** compute $\int_0^{\sqrt{\pi}} x \sin(x^2) dx =$

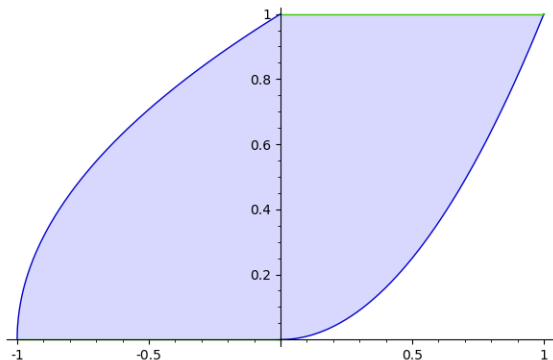
Solution: Take $u = x^2$ so $du = 2x dx$ and $dx = du/2x$. We then have $g(0) = 0^2 = 0$ and $g(\sqrt{\pi}) = \sqrt{\pi}^2 = \pi$ so we get

$$\begin{aligned} \int_0^{\sqrt{\pi}} x \sin(x^2) dx &= \int_0^{\pi} x \sin(u) \frac{du}{2x} \\ &= \frac{1}{2} \int_0^{\pi} -\cos(u) du = \frac{-1}{2} \cos(u) \Big|_0^{\pi} = \frac{-1}{2} (-1 - 1) = 1. \end{aligned}$$

S9: Integral Applications

(a) Sketch the region bounded by the curves $x = y^2 - 1$, $y = 0$, $y = 1$, and $x = \sqrt{y}$, and find the area of that region.

Solution:



We really want to integrate this with respect to y . So we have

$$\begin{aligned}\int_0^1 \sqrt{y} - (y^2 - 1) dy &= \int 1 + \sqrt{y} - y^2 dy \\ &= y + \frac{2}{3}y^{3/2} - \frac{y^3}{3} \Big|_0^1 = 1 + \frac{2}{3} - \frac{1}{3} = \frac{4}{3}.\end{aligned}$$

If we really want to, though, we can integrate with respect to x . We compute

$$\begin{aligned}A &= \int_{-1}^0 \sqrt{x+1} dx + \int_0^1 1 - x^2 dx \\ &= \frac{2}{3}(x+1)^{3/2} \Big|_{-1}^0 + x - \frac{x^3}{3} \Big|_0^1 \\ &= \frac{2}{3} - 0 + 1 - \frac{1}{3} - 0 + 0 = \frac{4}{3}.\end{aligned}$$

(b) What is the average value of the function $h(x) = x + \sqrt{x}$ on the interval $[1, 4]$?

Solution:

$$\begin{aligned}h_{ave} &= \frac{1}{3} \int_1^4 x + \sqrt{x} dx \\ &= \frac{1}{3} x^2/2 + \frac{2}{3} x^{3/2} \Big|_1^4 \\ &= \frac{1}{3} (8 + 16/3 - 1/2 - 2/3) = \frac{8}{3} + \frac{16}{9} - \frac{1}{6} - \frac{2}{9} = \frac{73}{18}\end{aligned}$$
