Major Topic 1: Computing Limits

Compute the following limits, justifying your answers with clean and correct work, using only tools we have discussed in class.

$$(a) \lim_{x \rightarrow -2} \frac{x - 2}{(x + 2)^2} =$$

Solution: The top approaches -4 and the bottom approaches 0, so

$$\lim_{x \rightarrow -2} \frac{x - 2}{(x + 2)^2} = \pm\infty.$$

Further, we see that the top is negative and the bottom is always positive, so in fact the limit is $-\infty$.

$$(b) \lim_{x \rightarrow 0} \frac{\sin(5x^2) + \tan^2(3x)}{x^2} =$$

Solution:

$$\begin{aligned} \lim_{x \rightarrow 0} \frac{\sin(5x^2) + \tan^2(3x)}{x^2} &= \lim_{x \rightarrow 0} \frac{\frac{\sin(5x^2)}{5x^2} 5x^2 + \frac{\sin(3x)}{3x} \cdot (3x) \cdot \frac{\sin(3x)}{3x} \cdot (3x) \cdot \frac{1}{\cos^2(3x)}}{x^2} \\ &= \lim_{x \rightarrow 0} \frac{5x^2 + \frac{9x^2}{\cos^2(3x)}}{x^2} \\ &= \lim_{x \rightarrow 0} 5 + \frac{9}{\cos^2(3x)} = 5 + 9 = 14. \end{aligned}$$

by the Small Angle Approximation.

$$(c) \lim_{x \rightarrow +\infty} \frac{3x^2 + 2x + 1}{\sqrt{x^4 - x^2 + x}} =$$

Solution:

$$\begin{aligned} \lim_{x \rightarrow +\infty} \frac{3x^2 + 2x + 1}{\sqrt{x^4 - x^2 + x}} &= \lim_{x \rightarrow +\infty} \frac{3 + 2/x + 1/x^2}{1/\sqrt{x^4} \sqrt{x^4 - x^2 + x}} \\ &= \lim_{x \rightarrow +\infty} \frac{3 + 2/x + 1/x^2}{\sqrt{1 - 1/x^2 + 1/x^3}} \\ &= \frac{3 + 0 + 0}{\sqrt{1 - 0 + 0}} = 3. \end{aligned}$$
